Simple awareness of language; one simple comment on the effect of language; simple textual detail. The rest of the response does not focus on language.

Level 2: 4 marks

Some understanding of language; attempts to comment on the effect of language; some use of appropriate textual detail; some use of subject terminology.

The comment on the effects of language in this response is better than in the previous response on Level 1, but the explanation is not yet sufficiently developed to be considered clear.

A typical level 2 response sometimes offers synonyms for the selected word. Here, "aggressive" is an appropriate synonym for "roaring", but "unhappy" is less successful.
